Cause: Dropping bow pressure at the tip or inconsistent finger pressure in higher positions. **Solution:** Practice **long tones** with a mirror. Ensure the index finger of the right hand applies gradual pressure as the bow moves toward the tip (compensating for the loss of weight from the frog).

Problem 2: String Crossing Noise in the Chorus
