

A Technical and Theological Analysis of Hal Lindsey's Eschatological Framework: The Impact of 'The Late Great Planet Earth'

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The publication of **The Late Great Planet Earth** (A Agonia do Grande Planeta Terra) in 1970 by Hal Lindsey and Carole C. Carlson marked a seismic shift in the landscape of popular theology and Western eschatological thought.
