2. Mechanics of Partizip II Formation

3.3 Separable Verbs in the Perfekt

When forming the Partizip II of a separable verb, the **-ge-** marker is sandwiched between the prefix and the base verb. Formula: **Prefix + -ge- + base verb stem + ending**. Example: *aufgegangen*, *mitgearbeitet*, *eingekauft*.

4. Temporal Prepositions: A Comparative Analysis of "Ab" and "Seit"
