The Mathematical Framework of Anomaly Detection

- Contamination of Audio: Whispers from team members or the sound of clothing rubbing against a microphone can be mistaken for EVP. Always use a "tagging" system (e.g., "that was my stomach growling") during recording.

The release of *A Haunting on Dice Road 2: Town of the Dead* on November 3, 2017, at the **Historic Temple Theatre** in Saginaw, MI, marked a significant cultural event for the region.
