The reach of Seth's work extends beyond the Anglosphere. Bibliographic records indicate significant translations that reflect the global appetite for Indian narratives. The Polish edition, *Prezydent do r* (2002), was split into multiple volumes (Tome 1, Tome 2, etc.) to manage the physical weight of the translated text, which often expands by 15-20% when moving from English to Slavic languages. Similarly, the French edition, *Un garçon convenable*, follows a multi-volume structure, a common practice for epics of this scale in European markets.

Quantitative Analysis: Narrative Density and Reading Metrics

To understand the sheer scale of Seth's achievement, we can apply quantitative metrics to the narrative.
